

Consolidated court means swifter justice for career thugs

A record number of defendants were prosecuted in Beaufort County last week at the same time a "career criminal" was being tried for kidnapping and rape.

For the first time, two courtrooms and two judges are being used simultaneously to handle felony cases in Beaufort County.

That will mean swifter justice for the worst repeat offenders while still allowing the prosecutor's office to handle its usual load of cases, said Solicitor Duffie Stone.

It also means the county can save money by calling only one jury panel for criminal court each month, instead of two.

"It's a win for everyone except the criminals," Stone said.

Patriotism should be contagious

If every community in America followed Bluffton's lead, not one overseas Marine or soldier would ever lack for beef jerky.

Or baby wipes. Or Xboxes. Or phone cards, DVDs, sunscreen, toothpaste or even homemade cookies.

We featured two groups of Blufftonians in Monday's BT — First Baptist Church members and the Moss Creek Marines — for sending dozens of boxes of goodies to our military men and women overseas. They aren't the only local groups doing so, either.

It's hard to imagine living your life on a forward, isolated military base under constant fire in a desert somewhere thousands of miles from home, fighting for a country you just hope remembers you.

Bluffton remembers, but our Marines and soldiers already knew that.

The First Baptist folks, for their part, "adopt" various military members with box after box of personal goodies, including those cookies we're drooling over. They don't have to do it. They don't know their adopted soldiers. They do it because it is simply the right thing to do.

For the Moss Creek Marines, there's that whole "semper fi" thing, "always faithful," once a Marine, always a Marine. You simply don't stop being a Marine once you're too old to man the frontlines. You just help your buddies in another way.

For the Moss Creek Marines, most recently, that meant adopting an entire battalion of Marines, 1,200 in all, most serving at eight Afghani frontline bases where showers are only distant memories. That's why those baby wipes come in handy.

None of this is cheap. Although the love and prayers are free, it costs big bucks to ship dozens of boxes to Afghanistan and Iraq. But it's worth it, because they're there for us.

Bluffton does its share. Let's hope other American towns follow our lead.
